Taking care of our brother

"This courageous sister dedicated her life to bringing the love of Christ to those who were far from homeland and family," Pope Francis said of St. Frances Cabrini commemorating the 100th anniversary of this great saint. "Her witness helps us to take care of the brother from a far-off land, in whom Jesus is present, often suffering, rejected and humiliated."

Coming to the United States in 1889, Mother Cabrini had a deep love for those who came to this new land. She came at a time when immigrants were arriving in the thousands. She saw first-hand that

integration was difficult as many ended up living in crowded tenement housing and forced to work for low wages. As bad as these conditions were, life would have been much harder for the immigrants and refugees she served had they stayed in their home country. Mother Cabrini dedicated herself to helping these people turn their lives around; welcoming them, encouraging them and helping them build the better life they came seeking in America. Faheem Rashidi understands what it's

like to be a stranger in a strange land.

When Faheem was just 8 years old, his father died. His mother took him and his siblings, left their home in Afghanistan, and walked to a refugee camp in Pakistan where they lived in tents for the next 8 years. In 2000, he and his siblings immigrated to Lincoln.

follow his dreams. After three years of taking ESL classes, he was admitted to the University of Nebraska-Lincoln where he excelled. He then went on to complete his pharmacology degree at Creighton, fulfilling his mother's dream that he be the first of his generation to complete college.

Faheem and the Piepers became close friends. One evening, Tim took Faheem to the Old Country Buffet (now the current home of Catholic Social Services). It was then Faheem met Rabia, who was a waitress. They both had arrived in Lincoln a few months before, and attended school together. They've now been married for 12 years and have three daughters.

Faheem is truly living the American

dream. He is the owner of Lincoln Pharmacy, located at 33rd & A Street in Lincoln. Faheem and Rabia are dedicated to helping Afghan refugees adjust to life in Lincoln. In March, they hosted a welcoming event at Embassy Suites in Lincoln. Hundreds attended to learn more about what services are available to them to help them get acclimated to their new home. Reflecting on his own experience, Faheem says though language is the biggest challenge facing these refugees, the first thing they need is a welcoming smile and to be considered part of the community.
