Even as a writer of one of the four Gospels, little is actually known about the life of St. Matthew. We do know that he was a tax collector in Capernaum, the likely place of his birth.

We also know that as a tax collector in the time of Christ. Matthew held an occupation that made him hated by his fellow Jews. After his calling, St. Matthew gave a feast in Christ's honor that was attended by fellow

tax collectors and

others labeled as

"sinners" by society. Upon hearing the Pharisees objecting to Jesus eating with sinners and outcasts, Christ responded with His message of salvation: "I have not come to call the just, but sinners."

After the Ascension of our Lord, it is believed that St. Matthew preached the Gospel to the Hebrews for about 15 years. He then answered the call of God to go and evangelize in Syria, Media, Persia, Parthia, finishing in

Ethiopia where he was martyred for the Faith.

years, Elaine had no trouble getting a job.

For years Elaine did volunteer work in New Orleans. The Lincoln location of H&R Block where she found work is just a couple of blocks from the Catholic Social Services location on O Street. When she saw the CSS sign she said to herself, "Alright God, You hit me on the head twice now, we got this!" So she walked down the street to ask about volunteering and was told CSS is always looking for volunteers so she signed up.
