A humble servant of God

Many of you know the holiness and piety of St. John Vianney. Vianney is the patron of parish priests. He would hear confessions for most of the day. He lived an austere life of penance, offering up sufferings on behalf of himself and his people. He would eat a boiled potato per day

and would fast in reparation for sins. He offered Sacrifice and was a living sacrifice for his people. He understood the Mystical Body of Christ. He understood that although many may not come to Christ or repent of their sins still---with

each individual life mystically united together in the Body of Christ---he could repent and make reparation for others' lives and sins. His feast day is August 4th.

One priest of the Diocese of Lincoln that many do not know about who emulates the virtue of St. John Vianney is Father Joe Finn. Father Finn is in residence at St. Mary's in Lincoln. His primary assignment includes coverage of many of the hospitals in Lincoln. His assignments include pastoral care at Bryan LGH West and East, Madonna Rehabilitation Hospital, and the Lincoln Regional Center. He



n Regional Center. He is diligent in his duties and is on-call 24 hours per day. He hears the confessions of people nearing death. He gives the dying the Anointing of the Sick, Viaticum, and the Apostolic Pardon.

Perhaps more than any priest in our Diocese----given that he administers the Last Rites, the Apostolic Pardon, and brings Viaticum to people daily who are dying and near death in the hospitals----his work perhaps sends the most people to Heaven.
