

had lost her job and was unable to pay her rent. Since she was the sole bread winner in the household, and living paycheck to paycheck, she was unable to pay the current month's rent. What made matters worse; she was facing a three days eviction notice. She was in desperate straits. Not being Catholic, she heard about us and after entering our doors found solace and peace kneeling and crying in front of the Blessed Sacrament. It was there she found the peace that only God can give to a broken heart.


The good news was that she had found another job and she knew if she could find someone or some group to help her with the current month's rent, she



CSS Christmas Programs serve thousands

With the onset of colder weather and the holidays quickly approaching, this is the time of year that our Social Services programs has the highest amount of requests for help. In an effort to meet the demand during the holidays, the Catholic Social Services Christmas Programs provide gifts to thousands of individuals across southern Nebraska each year. Through our Hastings, Lincoln and Auburn offices, we provide gifts and food baskets for families, children and individuals who might otherwise go without during the holidays. Our ability to provide to those in need through these programs relies greatly on the generosity of our donors and volunteers. Our programs include:

- ***KFOR Operation Santa Claus.** For years, we have participated in Lincoln radio station KFOR's Operation Santa Claus. Clients fill out applications at our office requesting specific items for their children. The requests are sent to KFOR, who place them on area "Giving Trees." The donated presents are delivered to our office, where clients pick them up.
- •The St. Nicholas Toy Shoppe. Catholic Social Services works with coordinators at participating parishes to randomly select the age and gender of the child and a toy for children twelve and younger. The toys received are taken to the St. Nicholas Toy Shoppe, located at the CSS offices in the St. Joseph Center at 2241 O Street. The Toy Shoppe will be open on Wednesday, December 22nd from 9am-Noon and 1-6pm. Customers may pick out one new toy and one stocking stuffer for each of their children. Last year, the St. Nicholas Toy Shoppe provided toys for over 3,000 children.
- ◆Adopt-A-Family. Individuals, families and groups can adopt a family. Mostly gifts are purchased, but a food basket can be given. The maximum value of each gift is \$25 per person.
- •Good Angel Trees Program. In Hastings, St. Cecilia and St. Michael parishes, along with St. Ann parish in Doniphan, provide gifts and food baskets to needy families in the area. Each parish puts up a christmas tree and places "angels" on the tree with suggestions for gifts for children from baby to 14 years of age. Parishioners purchase gifts and food baskets and return them to the church. Toys are organized for needy families to choose a gift for each of their children and have them gift wrapped by volunteers. Families also receive a food basket from either the Good Angel Program or from Catholic Social Services.

Not long ago, a middle-aged man with tears welling in his eyes told me how grateful he is for our Immaculate Heart of Mary Counseling Center. One of his best friends told him that if it wasn't for the help his son received in our clinic, he is convinced he would not be alive today.

There are many stories that could be told but because of the sensitive nature of these cases, they remain unknown to the general public. But the word has progressively spread through the years of the psychological and spiritual healing individuals and families receive in our clinics.

Our highly trained mental health professionals provide counseling to individuals, couples, and families young and old for a wide range of psychological difficulties. In addition, we answer the Project Rachel/post-abortion counseling hotline for the entire state of Nebraska. Not only do we accept most insurance plans

and Medicare, we also have a grant system that supplements payments for individuals who are un-insured or under-insured, thanks to the generous support of the people of southern Nebraska.

The unique quality of our clinic is that we incorporate the Catholic faith in our counseling. How can we divorce the grace of God with what our clinicians can provide? I am happy to inform you that our new clinical director of the Immaculate Heart of Mary Counseling Center is Dr. Tony Palmer, who received his PhD at the University of North Carolina. Dr. Palmer was Catholic Social Services' first psychological intern in 2002 and then spent 3 years on the faculty of what is now Divine Mercy University in Arlington, VA. He and his wife Bridget were raised near Atlanta, GA where they have been living since 2006 with their five lovely children. We are blessed to have Tony at CSS and he and his family in Lincoln!

It is easy to remember that Catholic Social Services helps feed the hungry, clothe the naked, helps those who are homeless escape homelessness and those who are not homeless avoid it, etc., but it is sometimes easy

to forget that our charity grant program helps those who cannot afford the full cost of our counseling services for some reason because of being un-insured or under-insured. It is also for this reason we are grateful to our many generous benefactors who by their loving support allow us to help these individuals who access our services young and old.

At this most holy time of year let us be most grateful for the best gift ever given from God our Father – the gift of His Only Begotten Son Jesus Christ, "Born of woman, born under the law, to redeem those who were under the law, so that we might receive
