Do you live in the CSS desert? Sadly, it's a term I've heard recently that references places in our Diocese without the physical, or even felt, presence of Catholic Social Services. While it doesn't exude feelings of warmth or joy, and to be honest from an executive director's perspective is fairly concerning, my hope is that our continued efforts and vision for the future will cultivate a sense of belonging for all who live within the Diocese whether you are in a CSS desert or not.

In January 2023, Hope Weninger, a wife, mother and parishioner at St. Mary Catholic Church in Nebraska City, joined the CSS Auburn team as our family support services specialist. Hope assisted clients who called for help with rent, utilities and other expenses that presented a financial hardship to the family. In the months that followed, as CSS ramped up our sustainability and recycling efforts in Lincoln, Hope was quick to jump in and support our new ecommerce operations. Today, Hope, who also has an MBA, works full-time as our accounting & human resource manager.

As a pro-family, Catholic agency, we prioritize family, and are actively building internal support to take care of one another. In September, Jolene Frook joined our team. She and her family live in Geneva and are parishioners at St. Joseph Catholic Church. Jolene arrived rather timely, starting her role as organizational resilience associate, a unique position that invites her to lean into any program, at any time, in either Lincoln or Hastings. With a team of over 70 staff members, we occasionally face unexpected life events, such as surgeries or deaths in the family, as well as planned absences, like the arrival of a new baby or an extended trip home. However, since it's our responsibility to respond to

the urgent needs of the community, there are always activities and services that require our attention.

We are blessed that Jolene came to us with more than 20 years of experience in the mental health field. Her knowledge, reliability, and caring nature make her an excellent fit to respond to our staff needs and clients at a moment's notice

The newest member to join our team and help us increase visibility and strengthen the CSS desert, is Jennifer Hinze from McCook, Nebraska. She and her family are parishioners at St. Patrick Catholic Church in McCook. Jennifer joins our team to serve as the family support specialist for the western part of our Diocese, a role formerly held by Tonya Olsen and based in Imperial. With Jennifer located in McCook, CSS is eager to collaborate with the great church groups and nonprofits in the area and serve as an additional resource that meets the needs of the poor and vulnerable while living our core values of dignity, integrity, empathy, trust, and sustainability.

CSS donor and volunteer, John White agrees: "I was fortunate to work for a large corporation during my career and accumulated shares over the years," said White. "The cost basis of those shares is very low, so if I sold them there would be capital gains to pay. But since I donated them to CSS, I can use their full market values as a charitable deduction and CSS gets the full value. It's a win - win!"

Why Consider a Gift of Stock?


A gift of stock can be a tax-savvy way to make a difference. White added that supporting non-profit organizations like CSS that make the community a better place is important. "Using appreciated stock or donating directly from an IRA can have significant tax advantages depending on your financial situation and age."

How Does It Work?

Contact CSS: Reach out to CSS to obtain our brokerage account information and ensure the transfer process is seamless.

Instruct Your Broker: Notify your financial advisor or broker of your intent to donate stock, providing them with CSS's account details.

Confirm the Gift: Once the transfer is complete, CSS will acknowledge



your gift and provide the necessary documentation for your tax records.




Our Mission is to perform the Works of Mercy in response to the call of God.

Finding hope during a tough time

Each week, our Family Support Services receives an endless stream of phone calls from individuals facing overwhelming challenges. On the other end of the line are people like "Laura," their voices carrying desperate pleas for help. Our dedicated team listens with compassion and responds with empathy, offering both hope and support in a time of crisis.

For the past five weeks, Laura has been running herself ragged caring for her 14-year-old daughter, who was hospitalized in Lincoln.

The demands of being by her daughter's side meant she had to miss work, and she soon lost her job. Recently, her daughter was transferred to Children's Hospital in Omaha. On the way to the hospital, Laura's car broke down. With no other options, she called the police, who towed her car to the hospital parking lot.

Laura's family was already in a dangerous financial position, living paycheck to paycheck. Their rent is \$735/month with a housing voucher, but her husband's income can only stretch so far. It covers food and part of the bills, but with everything needed to support Laura, her husband, and

their three teenage children, it comes up short.

Laura knew she couldn't navigate these difficult times alone. She turned to CSS for help with car repairs, rent, and utility bills to keep her family afloat. Thanks in large part to our donors, our Family Support Services staff could step in and cover the utility bills in full contributing \$740 toward their rent, helping the family manage their \$1,740 car repair bill.

Laura's family can now focus on what matters most—caring for their daughter and looking ahead with renewed hope for the future.
