St. Gianna Program

"Why don't they just pick up and leave?"

Rene (not her name) sat in my office crying softly now and then during our conversation. It was her last day at our St. Gianna Program (SGP) home, and she was turning in her key. She wanted to go but she wanted to stay. For many months, SGP home had been her home where she and her child were safe. Now she was ready to move on. But like so many of our other former residents, she will probably be looking over her shoulder for the rest of her life wondering if her abuser will find her. As we visited, she said, "if it hadn't been for all of you at St. Gianna's taking me in, I would be dead." She didn't say this lightly, it was unfor-

tunately the truth and we have heard this comment many times over. What possesses a man to threaten a woman with death once they leave? What possesses a man to strangle a woman to unconsciousness, hitting their head with a baseball bat, punching out their front teeth, banging their heads against the wall (causing brain damage), stabbing her, beating her to unconsciousness, threatening to harm the children or take them with him, sexually abusing her and her children? And the list goes on. We have had many such cases over the years.

There have been situations where I have heard people say, "Why don't they just pick up and leave?" This comment shows a

> complete ignorance of just what domestic violence is, and I cringe every time I hear it. If you were a little mouse in my office while I was visiting with these ladies, you would hear why they have their teeth knocked out, why they are suffering from third degree burns on their face and arms, why they now have brain damage and can't work. He cut them off from their own families,

wouldn't let them work, kept all their money if they did work, accused them of being a poor mother, being unfaithful, convinced them they were crazy, unfit in every way. How many times did some of them try to escape but went back because the guy said he would change, or they had no place to go, nor did they have money or a car to support (Continued on back page)

Catholic Social Services of Southern Nebraska (CSS) is thrilled to share some significant updates and exciting opportunities with our Hastings community. As we continue our mission of feeding the hungry and supporting those in need, we are making a meaningful shift in our approach, all while embracing new ways for you to get involved and make a difference.

A New Chapter: Transitioning Food Recovery Operations

Since 2005, CSS has been at the forefront of combating hunger in southern Nebraska through our Food Recovery Program. Initially, we began by distributing surplus

bakery items from Russ's IGA in Hastings, and our efforts have grown significantly over the years. Our program expanded to include pickups from Walmart and Sam's Clubs, and by 2017, we were distributing food to 15 different pantries and shelters through a partnership with Food Bank for the Heartland.

However, as community needs have evolved, we've recognized the need for a change. In September, CSS transferred food recovery operations to

Crossroads Homeless Shelter, an organization wellequipped to serve a broad area including its shelters in Hastings, Grand Island, Kearney, and Lexington as well as the rural food pantries. This shift will help streamline our efforts and allow us to focus more on relational client interactions and other vital services.

New Opportunities for Volunteers

With this transition, we are excited to offer new volunteer opportunities for those eager to continue their support for CSS and our mission. Here's how you can get involved:

•St. Joseph Gift & Thrift: Join our team to help with sorting, pricing, and staging items at our thrift store. This role also includes opportunities to sharpen carpentry skills and assist with furniture operations.

•Family Support Services: Volunteer to stock the St. Gianna Closet with diapers and baby clothes or assist with our Family Support Services Closet, which provides essential hygiene and personal care items.

•Open Table / CSS Hastings Food Pantry: Help distribute sack lunches and/or food boxes, organize our pantry, or provide administrative support for special projects.

•Warehouse and Facilities Support: Engage in various tasks such as baling clothes, assisting with building repairs, and picking up and delivering furniture.

To accomplish this vision, CSS Hastings will soon embark on a renovation project. Season of Creation: reflections on stewardship and sustainability

Over the past month, CSS has reflected on creation care as we entered into the Catholic Church's 2024 Season of Creation – "Hope and Act with Creation." Pope Francis reminds us in his message for this Season of Creation (September 1, World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, through October 4, the feast day of St. Francis of Assisi) that the first fruit of the Holy Spirit is love and that as children of God, we must turn to Him, "this is our great hope," he says.

CSS upholds our Catholic identity as a guide for how we care for creation and our Southern Nebraska community

on creation as a reminder of God's great love for us because he designed it for us. We shared this message with our team and others throughout the month-long season.

CSS core values include dignity of the human person, integrity, empathy, trust, and sustainability. In 2023, the Sustainability Team defined what sustainability means at CSS including that CSS strives to preserve and improve the lives of those we encounter daily and for future generations. We'll continue to learn and grow on our stewardship and sustainability journey, and invite you to

The Sustainability Team also met (a monthly routine) to provide updates and assess efforts including waste diversion and recycling, garden management, organizational resilience, and more. The Team took action in collaboration with Project Impact,

a day of volunteering in the community led by Union College, in conjunction with College View Academy, and completed 60 volunteer hours in one morning on CSS sustainability projects. Finally, we advocated for the importance of stewardship and sustainability in our words and actions. We shared about the Season of Creation in an article in the Southern Nebraska Register that reflects another 100+ years by sustaining operations that align with the region's needs and growth.

In Spring 2025, CSS will welcome the community for an open house to share about CSS sustainability efforts and invite the community's feedback. Until then, thank you for all your efforts to care for humanity and creation.

*The Sustainability Team is an interagency team of 15 people from various programs and locations working together to lead care for creation and organizational resilience strategies. Sustainability is defined as "development that meets the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs."

their children. Many go back for the children's sake. As a side note, we have had several women we took in as residents who were living in a car with their children. We are talking about Lincoln, not New York City. We haven't seen it all but we at SGP have seen enough to realize that our city is not immune from the increase in numbers and horrors of cases of domestic violence.

At SGP we try to help each family in their unique and individual needs. After years of being brainwashed into believing that they are the problem, it takes some time for our ladies to rediscover their dignity and move on. So, when Rene made that comment, I reassured her that if it hadn't been for her hard work and effort to get her life back, she wouldn't be handing me the key to her SGP home and leaving for a new key to her new home. She worked hard and we are proud of her. She knows that she can return to visit any time and that we back her with our daily prayers. So, if there is ever a time you are tempted to say, "Why don't they just pick up and leave?" don't. Put yourself in the situation of these women and ask yourself, if this was my life situation, what would I do? There is no easy answer. God bless you all.
