

St. Kateri Tekakwitha/CSS Sustainability Initiative

Stewards of His Creation

St. Kateri Tekakwitha is the first Native American to be recognized as a saint by the Catholic Church. She was born in a Mohawk village in 1656. Her mother was an Algonquin and her father was a Mohawk chief. At age 19, Kateri Tekak-

witha converted to Catholicism, taking a vow of chastity and pledging to marry only Jesus Christ. Her decision was very unpopular with her community, and they accused her of sorcery. To avoid persecution, she traveled to a Christian native community south of Montreal.

As a Native American, Kateri embodied her culture's God-given call to be good stewards of Creation. The Iroquois tribes had a deep connection with the land, understanding the importance of managing resources carefully. Stanislaus Brzana, bishop of Ogdensburg said St. Kateri. "was a child of nature. Her sainthood will raise the minds and hearts of those who love nature and work in ecology."
